Supervisor Liaison Officer (SLO) update

I am writing this article as SLO for Western NSW, my name is Ken Hazelton. I am a GP and shared principal of a group practice in Orange. I've done this SLO role for a succession of regional training providers, and now GP Synergy in our region. As many of you have, I've lived through a lot of interesting GP training history. I hope to explain how we get satisfaction from our SLO roles, and share our wishes for what you could help us do better.

The SLO position exists with several responsibilities.

The 'liaison' in the title refers to helping communication up and down between GP Synergy management and on-the-job supervisors. Although we are included in these training updates, SLOs feel their most effective communication with supervisors happens when we see people face to face.

We try to get to as many supervisor events in our patches as we can to hear directly what issues are bothering people. We love being buttonholed and gently harangued. It gives us a sense that when we speak, we can both convey the extremes of supervisor opinion, as well as the consensus.

Our representation of supervisor opinion in NSW happens as representatives on the Regional Advisory Councils, and the Committee Overseeing Supervisor Education (COSE).

To varying extents from region to region, we get involved in resolving issues between supervisors and their registrars. There are times when a fellow supervisor is the preferred knowledgeable negotiator on behalf of a supervisor, and sometimes being told you are wrong comes easier from a peer!

There is a national network of SLOs that gets together for a full day meeting twice a year. General Practice Supervisor Australia (GPSA) now coordinates these meetings. These are both interesting and useful, with senior Department of Health officials attending to give updates and hear frank and fearless supervisor feedback. I am always impressed by the big differences across Australia in training issues, as well as the common worries we all share.

So what is on our SLO wish list to make the job better and more effective? Communication. Mostly, to have better and more frequent contact and feedback from a broader sweep of supervisors. The kilometres between SLOs do mean our own face to face get togethers are not as often as we'd like, and we have to rely on email and occasional video conferences to compare notes.

Remember the supervisor development day that is coming up on Saturday 16 June in Sydney. The program has been designed by supervisors for supervisors, and there will be opportunity for supervisors to meet their regional support staff and SLOs. It should be well worth giving up a precious Saturday.

And finally, although there are some advantages in having corporate knowledge and history under your belt, renewal and enthusiasm are important too. Next time there is a gap and an opportunity to step up to this representing role as a SLO, give it a thought.

2018.2 Term placement update

The deadline for practices to update registrar training vacancies for the 2018.2 term has now passed.

Next steps

- **18 April 2018:** GP Synergy is reviewing the available capacity in your subregion and may apply a cap on the number of registrars per practice or per supervisor to ensure equitable distribution across the subregion. On 18 April 2018, you will be advised of the outcomes of this review and any subsequent caps on capacity applied in your subregion. The application of these caps may affect the number of registrars your practice is able to employ.
- **23 April 2018:** Registrars can apply to practices within their assigned grouping.

Reminder

- Registrars who train up to 28 hours = 0.5 in cap
- Registrars who train between 28.1 hours and 38 hours = 1 in cap.
- Registrars who will be in an EAF term will be included in the cap.
- Registrars can spend longer than six months in a training facility if they can meet their subregion training location requirements and college requirements (i.e. RACGP requires registrars train across two practices during their training).
- The method used to select registrars is up to the practice.
- Applications for placements must be made through GPRime2. No other method of confirmation will be accepted.

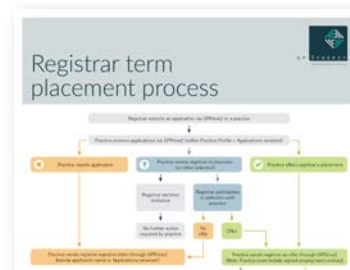

Important changes to contract and term placement/Medicare Provider number process

There is an important change in the GP Synergy contract and term placement/Medicare Provider number process:

- Once the practice has made an offer to a registrar and they have accepted, GP Synergy will review and approve the term (no change).
- **Important change:** At this stage, the contract for training between GP Synergy and the practice will be raised. The contract must be accepted by the practice for the relevant term placement paperwork required for provider numbers to be issued.
- Following the contract being accepted, the registrar will be sent the provider number paperwork to complete with a copy of this email sent to the practice (as per the usual process).
- The Recipient Created Tax Invoice (RCTI) for teaching allowances and practice subsidies, will be generated closer to the commencement of the term once the placement is secured and agreed.

Any changes to registrar training placement across the term (such as a change from full-time to part-time training, etc), will no longer require a new contract to be signed and once confirmed by both parties; the training records will be updated and if necessary a new RCTI will be raised.

Meet the MESP

This edition, Dr Richard Griffiths, a Medical Educator with Supervisor Portfolio (MESP) shares his tips on identifying registrar learning needs.

“You can’t eat an elephant all at once – you have to eat it in little bits,” were the words of my old trainer and mentor. He had a point – when registrars start in practice the primary care curriculum can be quite daunting so where to start – how can one plan one’s learning?

Not all registrars are the same and not all registrars will have the same learning needs. There are often generic learning needs that registrars need to cover when starting in practice such as the computer system, local referral pathways and Medicare billings. However, a registrar who has spent 10 years in an obstetrics and gynaecology post will not necessarily need to concentrate on this area once in practice.

Registrars are encouraged to formulate a learning plan for the term and are informed of how to put together a learning plan at GP Synergy induction. In my practice I ask the registrar to complete the self-assessment grid (found in forms, documents and links in GPRme2) to work out their areas of strength and weakness. I then ask the registrar to identify two to three topics they wish to cover and use as a basis for in-practice teaching. The registrar can update their learning plan as new learning needs develop.

It is important for a registrar in their first GP term to be able to handle certain high-risk areas such as the primary care presentation of chest pain, a febrile child, child with a rash or a new presentation of a chronic disease. The Supervision Plan Template (with high risk areas) can be used to assess the registrar’s level of competence in these areas. This is found in the Supervisors Toolkit, which again can be found by searching ‘toolkit’ in GPRime under ‘Forms, Documents and Links’.

In addition, for registrars in their first or second GP term in practice, there are a series of 16 modules in SupportGPT available in GPRime2 (under “Quick links and subscriptions”) that the registrar can work through at a pace of one per week. The one hour in practice teaching each week can be used to go over what the registrar has gained from each module. So hopefully as you can appreciate, by dividing the curriculum into “bite size chunks” we can make it more palatable!

Research project request:

How GP registrars and supervisors use delayed antibiotic prescribing for the treatment of acute respiratory tract infections



Participants: All GP supervisors and registrars

You are invited to take part in an interview as part of a research study into how GP supervisors and registrars use delayed antibiotic prescribing for the treatment of acute respiratory tract infections.

What is the research about?

The aim of this research is to investigate the use of delayed prescribing (when the doctor gives the patient a prescription with advice to not use it unless symptoms worsen or improvement does not occur by a certain time) of antibiotics for respiratory tract infections.

Why am I being asked?

We are inviting all registrars and supervisors from GP Synergy to participate.

We will need participants from a diverse range of practices and experience, so as to get the most variety in our sample.

This study will contribute to our understanding of this topic, and to creating better educational approaches for GP registrars.

What do I have to do?

Participants will be asked to complete a telephone interview regarding their experience and perceptions of delayed prescribing of antibiotics. This will take approximately 30 minutes to complete.
